Course Description

History of manufacturing. Principles, design, and analysis of lean manufacturing systems. Small lot production, setup-time reduction, continuous improvement. Principles and control of push and pull manufacturing systems. Production planning and operations scheduling (3 credits).

Course Objectives

- Convey the general history of manufacturing systems.
- Identify the design and difference between mass production and lean production.
- Compare and contrast the culture, organizational structure and leadership in Mass and Lean environments.
- List and describe the Types of Waste and why waste elimination is a core component of Lean Manufacturing.
- List and describe lean functionality (i.e., continuous improvement, pull systems, Kanban, etc).
- Articulate why the "Rules in Use" were a breakthrough in understanding the Toyota Production System.
- Use quantitative methods to model, analyze, and optimize production systems.

In-Class Recording
